

WHAT'S A 'TOUR'?



A road trip tour????



NO! A cycle tour???



Tours are just groups of classes with a set of rules and restrictions about previous winnings and success, so that you compete against horses/ponies and riders/handlers of similar experience.





SMALL TOUR: is like any 'Novice' class with restrictions on previous experience and winnings.



GRAND TOUR: is more like an 'Open' unaffiliated class, open to more levels of experience. Novices can enter too!

MINI TOUR: Just like any 'Beginners' or 'Have-A-Go' class, the Mini Tours are for very inexperienced combinations

What's In a Tour?

Can I compete in more than one Tour?

Mini Tour: Dressage has Lead Rein & Have-A-Go (assisted); Show Jumping covers Lead Rein to 45cm.

Compete in other Tours?





Mini Tour classes are exclusively for beginners, if you compete in Mini Tour classes you **cannot** compete in other Tours in the same discipline. You'll also be restricted in other disciplines, e.g. you cannot compete in the 40cm show jumping and the 90cm eventers challenge or take part in the lead rein dressage and a ridden hunter class.

Small Tour: Dressage at Intro,
Prelim & Novice; Show Jumping from
50cm to 75cm; Eventers Challenge
cover 50cm to 70cm; Showing
includes all sorts of Novice &
Newcomer and Equitation classes,
plus fun and have-a go classes.

Compete across Small & Grand Tours?





If you are eligible for the 'lower' Tour, you can cross into the next Tour up. There are limits on how 'far apart' you can compete, so in dressage you can compete in 2 levels e.g. Intro & Prelim, but not Intro & Elementary, in show jumping it's no more than 20cm apart e.g. if you compete in 60cm, you can only go as far as 80cm and wouldn't be able to 'jump' up to 1m.

Grand Tour: Dressage has Prelim, Novice & Elementary; **Show Jumping** from 80cm to 1m; **Eventers Challenge** 80cm and 90cm; **Showing** features all 'traditional' style classes for in-hand and ridden, plus working hunter and lead rein.
